NOTES:

- 1. Originally formed in 1939 as the duplicate of the 52nd (Lowland) Infantry Division, this division had remained in the United Kingdom since formation. It had been placed on lower establishment in November 1941, but was placed on higher establishment and re-organised as a mixed division in March 1943. The armoured brigade left the division in September 1943, it reverting to a traditional infantry division establishment. The division arrived in Normandy on 142 June 1944 (D + 8). It was involved in the battle for The Odon between 25 June and 2 July 1944, under the command of XII Corps. It then fought in the battle for Caen between 4 and 18 July 1944, and the battle for Mont Pincon between 30 July and 9 August 1944. It crossed the River Seine at St. Pierre de Vouvray at the head of XII Corps on 29 August. The Division, still under XII Corps, was involved in the battle of the Nederrijn (Operation Market Garden) between 17 and 27 September 1944. In January 1945, it transferred to XXX Corps, and took part in the battle for the Rhineland between 8 February and 10 March 1945. The Division, now under command of XII Corps, was one of the two British Divisions to lead the crossing of the River Rhine. The assault units launched their attack at 02.00 hours on 24 March 1945. It transferred to VIII Corps for the final advance into Germany. In early 1947, the division returned to the United Kingdom, and was disbanded. As a second line T.A. formation, it was not reformed as part of the reconstituted Territorial Army.
- This was one of the original brigades in the division when it was formed in 1939. This brigade and all the constituent battalions were disbanded in 1947. The 8th Bn. The Royal Scots and 6th Bn. The Border Regiment were original battalions from the formation of the brigade.
- 3. This battalion transferred into this brigade from the 45th Infantry Brigade on 28 December 1942.
- 4. This was also one of the original brigades. The 2nd Bn. The Glasgow Highlanders was the only original battalion to remain with the brigade throughout the war. The 9th Bn. The Cameronians transferred in from the 45th Infantry Brigade on 28 December 1942, and the 7th Bn. The Seaforth Highlanders transferred in on 15 November 1941 from 216th Independent Infantry Brigade (Home).
- 5. This brigade was formed on 15 February 1941 for service in the United Kingdom. The 10th Bn. The Highland Light Infantry transferred to this brigade from 46th Infantry Brigade on 3 December 1942. The 2nd Bn. The Gordon Highlanders joined this brigade on 31 July 1943. The original 2nd Battalion had been captured at Singapore in February 1942, so the 11th Battalion was redesignated on 28 May 1942 as the replacement 2nd Battalion. The 2nd Bn. The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders was formed on 5 May 1942 by the redesignation of the 15th Bn. of the regiment. This was due to the capture of the original 2nd Battalion by the Japanese in Singapore on 15 February 1942. It remained with the brigade throughout the war.
- 6. Formed in January 1941, as the 15th Battalion, Reconnaissance Corps, the regiment was designated as shown on 1 January 1944.
- 7. This battalion was the divisional machine gun unit, originally joining the division as the support battalion on 1 October 1943. It was designated as the machine gun battalion on 18 March 1944. The battalion had been formed in 1939 as the 2nd/8th Bn. The Middlesex Regiment, but was redesignated on 28 May 1942 following the capture of the original 1st Battalion in Hong Kong in December 1941.

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- 8. This regiment was formed in March 1942 by the conversion of the 6th Bn. The King's Shropshire Light Infantry. It joined this division on 7 November 1942.
- 9. This unit was formed in December 1942 by personnel from 9th Armoured Division. It joined this division on 29 March 1943.
- 10. This regiment had been formed in July 1942 with batteries transferred from the 63rd and 64th Anti-Tank Regiments. It joined this division in August 1942. It left in December 1944 to be disbanded. It was replaced by:

102nd (Northumberland Hussars) Anti-Tank Regiment, Royal Artillery

This regiment transferred in from 50th Infantry Division on 5 December 1944.

- 11. This unit was formed in February 1942 by the conversion of the 10th Bn. The Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment. It joined this division on 18 May 1943.
- 12. This field company joined the division on 26 March 1943 when it was raised to the higher establishment.
- 13. The field park company joined the division on 14 January 1943.
- 14. The bridging platoon joined the division on 1 October 1943.

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
