### **NOTES:**

- 1. This formation was raised on 1 December 1941 on the lower establishment by the redesignation of the Devon and Cornwall County Division. On 20 December 1942, it was reorganised and redesignated as the 77<sup>th</sup> Infantry (Reserve) Division. It was reorganised again on 1 December 1943 for sorting, retraining and holding personnel who were unassigned due to disbandment of other units, transfer from other arms or services, those returning for medical reasons, and personnel arriving back in the United Kingdom from service overseas. The division was disbanded on 1 September 1944, when its functions were taken over by the 45<sup>th</sup> Infantry (Reserve) Division.
- 2. This brigade was formed on 11 October 1940 by Number 3 Infantry Training Group. It was formed in the South West Area, and it joined the Devon and Cornwall County Division when it was formed on 24 February 1941. That division was redesignated as the 77<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division, and the brigade remained with the division. When the division was disbanded, the brigade was redesignated as the 134<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade on 1 December 1944, then joining the 45<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division.
- 3. This brigade was formed on 13 October 1940 by the Number 9 Infantry Training Group. Initially it was based in the South West, but it joined the Devon and Cornwall County Division on 28 February 1941. It became part of the 77<sup>th</sup> Division on the redesignation of the county division on 1 December 1941. When the division was disbanded, the brigade was redesignated as the 135<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade on 1 September 1944 and transferred to the 45<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division.
