NOTES:

1. The division was a pre-war Regular Army formation stationed at Aldershot, where its headquarters were located. The division mobilized at the outbreak of war, under the command of Major General H. R. L. G. ALEXANDER. The division arrived in France on 20 September 1939. The division was under the command of I Corps, until 19 May 1940 when it transferred to II Corps. The division withdrew back from the Dyle Line to the that of the River Escaut, transferring to II Corps. On the River Escaut, the division was deployed with I Corps on the right and the 3rd Infantry Division on the left. All three brigades were deployed in the front line, leaving no reserve. On 24 May, the division reverted to the command of I Corps. The division was evacuated from Dunkirk on 2 June 1940. Following evacuation from Dunkirk, the division remained in the United Kingdom, being converted to a mixed division in June 1942. In November 1942, it reverted to a standard infantry division establishment. The division arrived in North Africa in March 1943, serving in the Tunisian campaign. After Tunisia, the division captured the island of Pantelleria in the Mediterranean. It was one of the assault divisions in the landings at Anzio in January 1944, continuing to serve in Italy for the next twelve months. In February 1945, it moved to Palestine, where it was stationed at the end of the war.
2. A pre-war Regular Army brigade, Brigadier M. B. BECKWITH-SMITH commanded this formation throughout the campaign in France and Belgium. He later assumed command of the 18th Infantry Division and died as a prisoner of war in the Far East.
3. This formation was another pre-war Regular Army brigade. Brigadier C. E. HUDSON commanded this brigade throughout this campaign until 14 December 1940.
4. This brigade had been formed in the United Kingdom on 13 February 1940, as an independent infantry brigade. It came under command of this division on 6 December 1942, whilst the division was based in the U.K..
5. This regiment was formed in January 1941, as the 1st Battalion, The Reconnaissance Corps, coming under the command of the division on 8 January 1941. Its designation was changed on 6 June 1942 from a battalion to a regiment.
6. During this period, the division did not have a machine gun or support battalion allocated to it. The 4th Bn. The Cheshire Regiment had left on 1 October 1942, and the 2nd/7th Bn. The Middlesex Regiment did not join until 17 August 1943.
7. The original anti-tank regiment allocated to this division, the 21st, left the division on 10 October 1941. It was replaced by this regiment, which had been formed in September 1941 with batteries from the 21st, 59th, 62nd and 66th Anti-Tank Regiments. It joined this division on 5 November 1941.
8. This regiment was formed in November 1941 by the conversion of the 7th Bn. The South Wales Borderers. It joined this division on 27 January 1942.

10. The Commander Royal Artillery for this division during the 1940 campaign in France and Belgium was Brigadier C. W. P. PERCEVAL.

On the outbreak of the Second World War, when the division mobilized, the three companies of the Royal Army Service Corps allocated to the division formed an Ammunition Company, Petrol Company and Supply Company. For this division, the 7th, 40th and 42nd Companies, Royal Army Service Corps, formed these three units. Prior to the 10th May, the divisional Royal Army Service Corps reorganised into 7th, 40th and 42nd Infantry Brigade Companies, with each unit responsible for the supply of ammunition, petrol and general supply to a allocated infantry brigade. A new Divisional Troops Company was formed at the same time to supply those units not under brigade command.
12. The division was allocated a mobile bath unit. Each unit had a numeric designation, but it is not known which specific unit served with this division.
13. At some time in late 1939 or early 1940, this unit was redesignated as the 1st Infantry Divisional Provost Company, Corps of Military Police.
14. This cavalry regiment, equipped with light tanks, carriers, and scout cars, was attached from G.H.Q. Troops as the divisional reconnaissance regiment.
15. Attached from I Corps Troops, this machine gun battalion, served with this division for the duration of the campaign.
16. This machine gun battalion was attached to the division from G.H.Q. Troops when it deployed along the Escaut Line in Belgium.

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
