## NOTE:

1. This division was a Vichy French formation, which converted to the Allied cause and initially became the Division de Marche du Maroc. It became part of the French XIX Army Corps, the traditional designation of the French Army in Africa, which dated from 1873. The Corps was reformed in November 1942 following the Allied invasion of French North Africa and the armistice agreed by the Vichy French administration in North Africa. This is believed to be the order of battle for this formation in December 1942. It is possible that this division had a squadron of light tanks attached to it. In May 1943, the French XIX Corps was reorganised to become the French Expeditionary Corps for deployment in Italy in December 1943. It also fought in the battles for the Gothic Line before landing in Southern France in August 1944.
