- 1. Prior to the outbreak of the Second World War, the New Zealand Army consisted of a small cadre of Regular Army personnel, supplemented by the New Zealand Territorial Force. On 6 September 1939, the decision was taken to mobilise a special force of three battalions, one from each of the three Military Districts. The 1st (Rifle) Battalion was raised by the Northern District, the 2nd (Rifle) Battalion by the Central District, and the 3rd (Rifle) Battalion from the Southern District. By 3 October 1939, the Special Force became known as the New Zealand Division, and the three Rifle battalions became the 18th, 19th and 20th Infantry Battalions respectively in the new 4th New Zealand Infantry Brigade. The whole force was called the 2nd New Zealand Expeditionary Force. The First Echelon left New Zealand on 6 January 1940, arriving in Egypt on 15 February 1940. The Second Echelon was sent overseas on 2 May 1940 bound for the Middle East; however, it was diverted to the United Kingdom arriving on 16 June 1940. The Second Echelon eventually arrived in Egypt between 5 and 8 March 1941. The Third Echelon left New Zealand on 27 August 1940, and it arrived in Egypt on 29 September 1940. The division concentrated in Egypt in March 1941, and was immediately sent to Greece, arriving in late March or early April 1941. This is the order of battle for the division in March 1941.

1. The New Zealand Division was sent to Greece on the orders of the United Kingdom's Prime Minister, who for political reasons, wanted to send an Expeditionary Force to Greece to show support as the threat of German invasion became imminent. On arrival in Greece, the division appeared to reorganise from brigade groups to the standard divisional establishment. It was deployed on the Aliakmon Line. The German Army invaded Greece on 6 April 1941, and the Allies were soon forced to retreat. The New Zealand Division was evacuated from Greece by 28 April 1941 and most units were taken to Crete. The majority of the division's artillery, transport and other equipment had to be abandoned in Greece. The division suffered some 890 casualties in Greece, of which 291 were killed. In addition, 1,614 New Zealand troops were left in Greece and became prisoners of war.

- 1. The division was evacuated from Greece to Crete by the end of April 1941. The division was given responsibility for the Maleme and Canea areas of Crete. It had lost many men and much material in Greece, particularly signals equipment and artillery. The Germans launched their famous aerial assault on Crete in late May 1941. After much valiant fighting by the tired troops, the Germans slowly gained territory and the remnants of the New Zealand Division were evacuated again, this time back to Egypt, where the division was reconstituted.
- 2. This brigade was formed in Crete to replace the absent 6th Brigade. When the division was reconstituted, the 6th Brigade again joined the divisional order of battle
- 3. This battalion was formed by personnel from the 4th New Zealand Field Regiment and Army Service Corps units. It was equipped as an infantry formation.
- 4. This regiment was the only New Zealand Artillery unit equipped with artillery during the battle for Crete. It appears it did not fight as a complete formation, but was split up into three batteries, one each being allocated to the three brigades.

1. After Crete, the division returned to Egypt. On 23 February, the division moved to Syria and came under command of 9th Army. The division remained in Syria until June 1942, when it moved back to Egypt in response to the Axis advance to El Alamein. The division travelled by road to Mersa Matruh in four days and fifteen hours, a total distance of 1,450 kilometres. The division was in position by 22 June 1942, and overnight 27/28 June, it was surrounded by Axis forces and had to execute a fighting withdrawal. On 29 June 1942, the division was formally redesignated as the 2nd New Zealand Division, principally for deception purposes as the N.Z. Expeditionary Corps Base in Egypt was given the designation of the 6th New Zealand Infantry Division. On 14 and 15 July 1942, the division attacked Ruweisat Ridge in a night assault. The New Zealanders captured the ridge, but in the absence of tanks and artillery, they were forced back on the evening of 15 July. The division sustained 1,405 casualties, the vast majority of whom were killed or captured. On 21 and 22 July, the 6th Brigade attacked the El Mrier Depression, but two battalions were effectively destroyed suffering about 900 casualties. This is the order of battle for the division at the battle of El Alamein on 23 October 1942. In lieu of the 4th N.Z. Brigade, the division was allocated a British armoured brigade, making this division the first mixed division. The armoured brigade allocated to the division was:
